RE: RECOMMENDATIONS AND ANNUAL REPORT FROM CHANCELLOR'S ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON STUDENT SERVICES AND FEES

The Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Student Services and Fees (CACSSF) respectfully submits this annual report as a summary of key student fee issues and recommendations from 2019-20. **Specific recommendations requiring approval are in bold.** Following your approvals, the Office of the CFO will communicate with UCOP as appropriate.

Background

The Chancellor's Advisory Committee on Student Services and Fees (CACSSF) was convened in 2006. The committee regularly advises the Chancellor and senior administration on student services funding and fee issues. The committee supports students through multi-year planning, closer partnerships with administration, and a coordinated process on student fees. CACSSF's voting membership includes nine student representatives (three each from the ASUC, Committee on Student Fees, and Graduate Assembly), six representatives from campus administration, and two Academic Senate-appointed faculty members.

CACSSF Recommendations

- 1) CACSSF strongly recommends that \$1,012,357 in newly available Student Services Fee (SSF) funds be allocated on a recurring basis to the items in Attachment A with funding beginning on July 1, 2020.
- 2) CACSSF recommends the approval of the following Miscellaneous Student Fee (MSF) recommendations in Attachment B:
 - New Accelerated Access Commitment Fee proposed by Haas School of Business
 - Decrease in the Digital Fabrication Lab Fee by College of Environmental Design (CED)
 - Decrease in the Fabrication Shop Fee by College of Environmental Design (CED)
- 3) As approved by the student body, three compulsory campus-based fees (the Recruitment and Retention Fee, the Educational Opportunity and Equity Fee, and the Campus Climate and Equity Fee) may request an annual inflationary adjustment, subject to review by CACSSF and your approval. The Campus Climate and Equity Fee has requested an increase of \$1.50 per semester per undergraduate and graduate student. The Educational Opportunity and Equity Fee and Recruitment and Retention Fee did not request a fee increase. Additionally, The Wellness Fee, The Green Initiative Fund Fee, Campus Health Fee, and Student Basic Needs Fee have fee increases for FY20-21. **CACSSF recommends approving these increases as requested.**

Additional Highlights

- 4) During the Spring 2020 semester, the Associated Students of the University of California (ASUC) Elections Council, in coordination with the Student Fee Referenda Committee successfully petitioned the UC Office of the President to lower the voting threshold for ASUC elections from the standard 20% threshold to 10%, in response to the move to remote instruction caused by COVID-19.
- 5) The Life Safety Fee Committee and CACSSF made a recommendation in early March 2020 to extend the The Life Safety Fee (LSF), a compulsory campus-based fee first instituted in 1992-93 to fund renovation projects that mitigate "life safety" (e.g., fire, hazmat, or seismic) risk in eligible (non-academic, non-enterprise) buildings that house student groups and student services activities. The fee, currently \$46 per student per semester, has been recommended for continuation until through Summer 2024, pending confirmation by the UC Board of Regents.
- 6) The California Public Interest Research Group (CALPIRG) made a request to CACSSF in early May to waive the minimum pledge threshold of 10% needed to collect voluntary campus fee revenue. CACSSF made a recommendation to the Chancellor to waive the minimum threshold for semesters disrupted by COVID-19. Per UC Guidelines for Implementing a Voluntary Student Fee Pledge System (the Guidelines), any exceptions must be requested by the Chancellor and approved by the UC President. This waiver is pending approval by the UC Office of the President
- 7) During 2019-20, CACSSF conducted a spring grant-making cycle and allocated approximately \$500,000 dollars in one-time funding from its discretionary fund to support student service initiatives, including over \$268,000 in one time funding to aid students during the COVID-19 pandemic. Funded projects are in Attachment D.

Background

The Student Services Fee (SSF), like tuition, is set by the Regents. Per UCOP policy, SSF revenue "shall be used to support services and programs that directly benefit students and that are complementary to, but not a part of, the core instructional program. These services and programs include, but are not limited to, operating and capital expenses for services related to the physical and psychological health and well-being of students' social, recreational, and cultural activities and programs; services related to campus life and campus community; technology expenses directly related to the service; and career support."

This year, the VC Student Affairs, VC Equity and Inclusion, VC Undergraduate Education, and VP Graduate Studies identified critical student service funding needs and presented those to CACSSF.

CACSSF's recommendations above assist the student services VC/VPs in addressing budget improvement targets and meeting emerging student needs.

13. Campus Climate & Equity: Increase is recommended by the EUCE Fee Advisory Board up to 3% based on CPUSF rate; reviewed by CACSSF; and approved by the Chancellor

14. Housing Security: Increase is recommended by Housing Initiative Student Fee Oversight Board up to 2.8% per year for inflation and approved by the Chancellor. Given the small fee level, CBO recommends that an inflation factor be applied using a compounded inflation rate, rounding down to closest \$0.25 per semester. The Summer 2020 fee level has been rounded down to a whole dollar amount, from \$4.25 to \$4.00, to avoid complications with financial aid packaging for 11 Wellness: increase is recommended by the Wellness Fund Advisory Committee (WFAC) based on multiple inflation rates, reviewed by CACSS; and approved by VC Student Affairs per Delegation of Authority memo dated August 26, 2015

Campus Health Care: Increase is recommended by Health Fee Advisory Board based on annual US 9LS inflation rate for physician and clinical services and approved by VC Student Affairs

Daily Cal INK initiative: Increase is recommended by Office of the Registrar (OR) based on the annual CPI-SF rate and approved by CACSSF. Given the small fee level, OR recommends that an inflation factor be applied using a compounded

inflation rate, rounding to closest \$0.25

Recruitment and Retention: increase is recommended by Student Oversight Committee based on City of Berkeley's Annual General Adjustment index: reviewed by CACSSF; and approved by the Chancellor

that an inflation factor be applied using a compounded inflation rate, rounding down to the closest \$0.25 per semester. The AMP Adjustment expires in Spring 2029
